AMENDMENT TO THE ~~WAGNER~~ AMENDMENT TO

H.R. 2473

OFFERED BY MS. BASS OF CALIFORNIA

On page 2, strike the amendment relating to page 2 of the bill, and insert the following:

Page 2, strike line 1 and all that follows through page 3, line 10, and insert the following:

1 **SEC. 3. TRAINING FOR PROSECUTIONS OF TRAFFICKERS**
2 **AND SUPPORT FOR STATE SERVICES FOR**
3 **VICTIMS OF TRAFFICKING.**

4 Section 107(b)(2)(B)(ii) of the Victims of Trafficking
5 and Violence Protection Act of 2000 (22 U.S.C.
6 7105(b)(2)(B)(ii)) is amended to read as follows:

7 “(ii) 5 percent for training and tech-
8 nical assistance, to be provided in coordi-
9 nation with the Secretary of Health and
10 Human Services, including with respect
11 to—

12 “(I) increasing capacity and ex-
13 pertise on security for and protection
14 of service providers from intimidation
15 or retaliation for their activities;

1 “(II) “investigating, prosecuting,
2 and preventing human trafficking
3 through a trauma-informed and vic-
4 tim-centered approach that provides
5 services and protections for victims of
6 trafficking;

7 “(III) facilitating the provision of
8 evidence-based, trauma-informed care
9 and physical and mental health serv-
10 ices to victims of trafficking;

11 “(IV) ensuring that all victims of
12 trafficking who are United States citi-
13 zens, lawful permanent residents, and
14 foreign nationals are eligible for serv-
15 ices;

16 “(V) ensuring that law enforce-
17 ment officers and prosecutors make
18 every attempt to determine an individ-
19 ual’s participation in human traf-
20 ficking is free from force, fraud, or
21 coercion of any means before arrest-
22 ing them for, or charging them with,
23 an offense;

24 “(VI) facilitating access for child
25 victims of trafficking to the same type

1 of court procedures and legal protec-
2 tions accessible to child victims of sex-
3 ual assault, rape, child sexual abuse,
4 or incest, and clarifying the right of
5 child trafficking victims to not be
6 treated as criminals as a result of
7 their victimization; and

8 “(VII) encouraging States to
9 identify the locations of victims of
10 trafficking, including through efforts
11 that utilize internet outreach, through
12 methods informed by survivors of
13 human trafficking, and to offer help
14 and services that are responsive to
15 victims’ needs.”.

On page 4, strike the amendment relating to page 5, beginning on line 11, of the bill, and insert the following:

Page 5, strike line 6 and all that follows through line 16, and insert the following:

16 (c) SURVEY.—Not later than 2 years after the date
17 of the enactment of this Act, the Director of the National
18 Institute of Justice, in coordination with Federal, State,
19 local, and tribal governments, and private organizations,

1 including victim service providers and expert researchers,
2 shall develop and execute a survey of survivors seeking and
3 receiving services through a model agreed upon by ~~human~~ *sex and labor*
4 trafficking service providers, government entities, and re-
5 search experts to better understand where and how victims
6 are accessing services, how they are referred to services-
7 -including referrals by first responders--how assessment
8 tools work to identify victims, and to help estimate the
9 prevalence of human trafficking and victim identification
10 in the United States. Survey results shall be made publicly
11 available on the website of the Department of Justice.

On page 5, strike the amendment relating to page
6 of the bill and insert the following:

Page 6, after line 25, insert the following:

12 (5) The annual number and percentage of Fed-
13 eral cases related to human trafficking, separating
14 sex trafficking and labor trafficking, during the pe-
15 riod beginning on June 1, 2015, and ending on the
16 date of the enactment of this Act, in which restitu-
17 tion was ordered, and the amount of restitution or-
18 dered in each case.

19 (6) Data on the participation and non-partici-
20 pation of victims of trafficking in criminal pro-
21 ceedings, data on the participation and nonparticipa-

1 tion of victims in witness protection programs and
2 services, and recommendations for encouraging the
3 participation of victims of trafficking in such pro-
4 ceedings.
